Elite happy to spend, battlers beg to differ

POLLSTER Michele Levine doesn't shy away from the word elite, arguing Australia has an educated, affluent intelligentsia with quite different views from the battlers.

Ms Levine, chief executive of Roy Morgan Research, yesterday released the results of an unusual survey that compared the opinions of the elite with those of the average Australian.

Among the highlights, it found the elite is not at all fussed about keeping a tight federal budget, and is quite happy for the Rudd Government to spend up big and go into debt.

By contrast, average Australians are far more wary of fiscal adventurism in spending their taxes on long-term projects such as renewing infrastructure.

Roy Morgan Research surveyed 650 Australians in a standard random poll about a wide range of social, economic and political issues. It also surveyed a perfect sample group for the elite: the participants at the Australian Davos Connection Future Summit in Sydney.

Half of the 250 participants, mostly leaders from the political, academic, and business worlds, filled in an anonymous questionnaire on some of the same questions posed in the broader survey. Only 4 per cent of the 125 summiteers who responded said the top priority for government policy over the next decade was

maintaining a balanced budget with no increase in public debt.

By contrast, 30 per cent of respondents to the general survey identified such fiscal conservatism as most important.

Among the elite, 38 per cent nominated infrastructure as the most important priority, compared with 29 per cent in the broader survey.

Ms Levine said the summiteers were mostly secure and affluent and more inclined to see money spent for the long term, while the general population was worried about more immediate economic circumstances.

"People today are very scared," she told *The Australian* after delivering her presentation.

"The issue of today is very

much formed on global economic problems."

Other Morgan research found that low official unemployment masked the 1.5 million Australians who were underemployed and having difficulty finding more work.

Another finding of the latest survey is that both the general population and the elite are far more concerned about the environment.

In a similar survey before an ADC summit in 2006, only 8 per cent of the broad survey and 18 per cent of the summiteers nominated the environment as the most important issue; this year, the figures were 30 per cent for the general population and 41 per cent for the elite.




What do you think is the most important problem facing the WORLD today?





"Most important issues facing Australia"


What do you think is the most important problem facing AUSTRALIA today?





"Most important environmental issues facing the world"


What do you believe are the important ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES facing the WORLD today?




"Regions most important for Australia for business purposes"




"Region important to Australia for security purposes"


